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### **SOCIETY NEWS**

A Message from the SBR President: The normal message delivered on this occasion is a sunny, self-congratulatory statement of how well the Society is doing. This is not a normal message from a Mutual Admiration Society but rather a plea for more participation, volunteerism, and publishable manuscripts, to name just a few of our needs. Jeffrey M. Mitchem, (jeffmitchem@juno.com), our former President, resigned that office to make the extreme sacrifice of volunteering as Secretary-Treasurer, the major Society office.

The small group of dedicated officers (your president excluded) are continually involved in the acquisition and publication of suitable manuscripts. The publication of longer works, especially with quality photographs, is the domain of *Beads* and its dedicated editor, Karlis Karklins (karlis.karklins@pc.gc.ca). You can aid in this work by sending your own suitable manuscripts or ferreting out manuscripts held by others (think about theses). If you do not want to track these down then at least give Karlis the author's address and a quick summary. The greater the pool to choose from, the better the content of the journal. Contact Karlis or any other officer today, please.

The Bead Forum with the subtitle of Newsletter of the Society of Bead Researchers, serves two functions, a place for Society news and announcements and an outlet for shorter works not appropriate for Beads. Michael A. (Smoke) Pfeiffer (mpfeiffer@fs.fed.us), the Forum editor, is a relatively new but hard working member to the SBR staff. Again, Smoke needs all the help you can offer in your submission of news and brief articles as well as new publication listings. The brief article route is also an excellent way to obtain ideas and opinions of others before committing a long manuscript to the scrutiny of a formal publication review.

Both editors, of *Beads* and the *Forum*, need to receive copies of new bead books so that they can be announced in the *Forum* and sent out for review in *Beads*. When submitting new publication announcements to the *Forum*, if you cannot send a copy then include all of the pertinent information plus a short description (not a review) as found in any recent *Forum*. For those who wonder how they can volunteer, while thinking about it, please submit your name as a willing reviewer to Karlis with an indication of your areas of expertise.

An important area of volunteer work is the translation of bead articles into English from other languages especially (alphabetical) Arabic, Chinese, French, German, Italian, Japanese, Russian, Spanish, and occasionally several eastern European languages. If you feel confident to undertake professional translation of bead works, please let me know (rsprague@moscow.com). No, I do not speak Russian; Moscow is in Idaho.

The records of the Society are now in order thanks to Jeff Mitchem's dedicated work. Now we need to increase the membership. Two classes of membership need your help as a volunteer. First, corner any of your friends in their office or around the water cooler and ask why they do not subscribe to such an inexpensive but beautiful journal with its color plates. Lay it on and if each of us gets one more membership, things will be vastly improved. The second thing to do is get the local office, regional office, local library, and university library to subscribe. A subscription to *Beads* for your rich and/or lazy brother-in-law who has everything, is a good Christmas gift. PayPal is now accepted and all back issues are available. *Beads* has appeal to both collector and professional and in at least one case with which I am familiar, a collector has turned into a dedicated researcher because of *Beads*.

## REPORT OF THE JOURNAL EDITOR

As will be evident to all SBR members, the Society's journal, Beads, is again behind schedule. This unfortunate situation has been caused by a lack of publishable articles. About a dozen articles have been promised to the editor, some as far back as 7-8 years ago, but only a couple have actually made it to his desk. In most cases, the problem is that the writers also have other comittments and cannot devote sufficient time to the completion of manuscripts. Another problem is that the journal must now compete with several bead society newsletters, the publications of two bead museums, and both domestic and foreign archaeological societies for publishable items. The internet is also pulling items that would once have gone to either the SBR journal or newsletter. This is understandable, but it does cause problems for the editors. I will not reiterate what has already been said by President Sprague, but I do urge those who have agreed to submit articles and book reviews to make good their promises. Without your input, the journal will not be able to continue.

On the bright side, Vol. 15 is currently being edited, and it is hoped that it will roll off the presses in June. Vol. 16 will follow as soon as there is enough material to fill its pages.
