## **OTHER BEAD RELATED NEWS**

*Beadwork* Bead Expo is coming to the beautiful East Bay area of Oakland-Berkeley, California! Block your calendars for this exciting event, to be held at the Oakland Convention Center Wednesday, April 11 through Sunday, April 15, 2007.

*Beadwork* is thrilled to bring Bead Expo, the nation's premier bead show, to the Oakland-Berkeley area in spring 2007. We hope you will join us at this one-of-a-kind event, which features many different types of workshops with world-class instructors, an international bead bazaar, and educational events that will appeal to beaders of all skill levels.

With Bead Expo 2007, Interweave Press continues a tradition begun in 1992 by Recursos de Santa Fe and the Center for Bead Research of the presentation of scholarly papers of interest to bead and beadwork collectors, students, and creators. Next year's two-day symposium (April 14-15, 2007) is organized by Alice Scherer of the Center for the Study of Beadwork, with further related activities organized by Karlis Karklins of the Society of Bead Researchers. The topic of the symposium will be Beaded Bags and Containers. There will be four speakers, two each on Saturday and Sunday mornings. Saturday's speakers will be Valerie Hector on Asian bags and containers over the last thousand years and Mrs. Makiko Katsuoka from the Miyuki Co. Ltd. in Japan. She will be talking about the Miyuki Company's development of the Delica beads and the Delica Bead Loom Association, and will also speak about the current interest in beadwork in Japan. On Sunday, Marcia Anderson, senior curator at the Minnesota Historical Society will speak about Ojibway Bandolier Bags, about which she is writing a book, and Lorita Winfield, co-author of Beads on Bags 1800-2000 will speak on collecting beaded bags. In the afternoons, there will be breakout sessions with each morning's speakers, as well as the SBR's traditional "What's New in Bead Research Session," organized by the ever-so-able Karlis Karklins, followed by the SBR meeting. Anyone currently in the midst of doing research is encouraged to contact Karlis to get your 15 minutes of fame in the What's New session at Karlis44@aol.com.

One of the afternoons, I would like to encourage a session of folks in the different bead type organizations to come together to discuss "Where Do We Go From Here". By that I mean that over the last 15 years, the field has changed so much, especially when you factor in the effect of the Internet, that many of our early assumptions of how we organize and disseminate information on beads and beadwork are no longer relevant or are less relevant. Anyone interested in helping create such a dialogue at the symposium, please contact Alice Scherer at <u>alice@europa.com</u> to discuss this further. More information will be forthcoming on Bead Expo's site later in the year or early next year.

I would very much like to encourage people to attend the symposium as the very survival of these sorts of events hangs in the balance of public demand. If there is no demand for events like these, they will cease to exist and the purely profitable events will take precedence. The basic goal is to have 85-100 attendees at \$100 each (or \$60 for one day), which will pay the basic cost of putting on the event. While we would all like to see the Expo go back to the nine speakers spread over three days as before (and be in Santa Fe!!), this will happen only if the two-day seminar is well enough

attended to give the impression that there is a demand for it. Just as with our country, every vote counts, so please consider your dollars spent to attend the symposium or not to attend to be the equivalent of a "vote" on the survival of the Bead Expo we all loved so much.
