transfer print sherds. Others included handpainted and banded categoris, red paste earthenware, stoneware, and porcelain. One porcelain sherd bears the identical medallion to that on the "Chinese Pordelain Cup" illustrated by Caywood from the fort excavation (1955, Plate XVIII). One unusual sherd was an unglazed terracotta vessel base.

Kaolin Pipes

Stem fragments totalled 163. Size distribution according to bore diameter was:

Bowl fragments totalled 33 shords. Thees were all plain or stamped Ford-Stepney.

Bottle Glass

Total sheeds of bottle glass numbered only 270. One hundred of these were from rum bottles. Sherds from the bases of at least 5 different bottles could be identified. These appear to have been 2 Hudson's Bay Company rum bottles, I amber bottle base, and 2 light green wine bottle bases. Shards recovered from the wood lined pit mend with these bases. No markings were present, all bottles appear to have been smashed.




The only food debris was 3 fragments of dong bone, too small to be identified. Also found were 3 horse teeth.

The Wood Lined Fit

This feature was discovered and excavated before the floor of House 3 was found. First noticed in square M4N-M5N was a small gravel line running northwest to southeast across the square (see cross-section drawing). Sectioning this gravel deposit revealed that the surrounding soil consisted of a mixed deposit of clay, sand, charcoal and artifacts. At the bottom of this deposit were several large rocks, an upright post, and decaying wood. Upon clearing the large rocks away, 5 parallel cedar boards were exposed. Iwo boards running at right angles to this planking were found on the north and south edges, all structural material above these was destroyed by the rocks and fill. Full exposure of these planks revealed a square platform of cedar boards 35" by 35", stubbs of upright posts were found at each corner, and a 6 Lb. cannon ball was found resting directly on one of the planks. fumerous small artifacts, notably beads, were also concontrated above the boards. Many small artifacts occurred within the sixed fill layers directly above the rocks. Some of thee cross-mended with material recovered from the clay floor of House 3.

House 4

House 4 was found during the excavation of the north end of the diagonal trench. The northern edge intersects the diagonal tranch at about 65 feet. It was visible in cross - section on the east wall and just touched the west wall of the trench. The house burnt and collapsed on itself with no subsequent disturbance. Ash and charred wood, nails and numerous artifacts covered a roughly rectangular area of about 61 feet by 8 feet. The debris varied between 2 incres to 6 inches depth. At the top of the debris was a fine white ash overlying a coarser reddish ash with remants of burnt planks and wood shingles. Under this debris, which must have been the roof, was a heavy concentration of artifacts. Those in the northern half of the house (33 S Trench, and the northern half of the 34S trench) were almost exclusively ceramic vessels, many of which were restorable. Artifacts in the southern half were primarily netal including a hoc, hatchet, sledge hammer head, gun parts and other tools. Below the ash and artifacts was a thin patchey layer of clay.

At the southeast corner of the house stood a stone hearth. The stones were set above the clay layer and

closely fitted together without mortar.


